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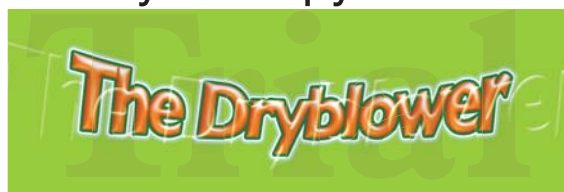

President's Report

October 2014

At its September meeting Council decided to return the Cue Beringarra road to gravel in a continuous operation.

The decision was a difficult one going against a petition which requested Council to retain the bitumen construction. The issue was simple but stark:-

Was the sum of money obtained from Mitsubishi sufficient to maintain the road as a bitumen seal; and to finance a complete rebuild when the road finally collapsed?

All projections, despite using generous factors for interest rates, and conservative ones for inflation, indicated shortfalls which if incurred could only be described as disastrous. Accordingly, Council made the prudent choice and decided in a tight 4/3 vote to instruct the C.E.O. to seek tenders for reverting the road to gravel.

I know the decision weighed heavily on many councillors and no one took any pleasure in the outcome, but it was sensible and removed the spectre of a financial catastrophe which would have overshadowed all future projects.

So to everyone who signed the petition, Council is truly sorry, for downgrading a road you hold dear, but no amount of apologising would ever compensate for the astronomic increase in rates which would be necessary to fund a bitumen road.

Sadly for us, our finance officer, Ariffin Gadait (better known as Junior) has resigned in order to take up a prestigious scholarship with the Malaysian Government. I take this opportunity to publicly thank Junior for his quiet, cheerful, dedication to his duties. We all wish him every success and hope to see him return to Australia representing his country in an official capacity!

From the C.E.O.s Desk

September has come and gone in the blink of an eye. When you look back at the month you realise what has been achieved and what is still required to be achieved. From a staffing point of view we have lost the services of Junior, our Senior Finance Officer. Junior has been accepted into a scholarship with the Malaysian Government and if successful will find himself in their Foreign Affairs Department. Junior has been an absolute pleasure to work with and we will miss him greatly. From a positive point of view, Junior's departure has allowed me to promote Peter Hutchinson to the position as the Senior Finance Officer. Peter is a degree qualified accountant and he has been learning Junior's roll over the last month and I anticipate that he will do a great job. I have advertised for a replacement for Peter's position both locally and in the West Australian. I have also employed Gordon Fraser as a plant operator on a casual basis; reports from staff indicate that Gordon is doing a very good job.

New plant and equipment have started to arrive so that we can further improve our productivity. We have taken delivery of a D6 Dozer and we have sold the traxcavator. A new side tipper has arrived making for a road train configuration, we have purchased a low hour multi-tyre roller which is currently being serviced and should be here in the next week or so. Various gardening appliances have been purchased to assist with the care and

maintenance of our parks and gardens.

Work has now finished on installing a concrete floor in the Machinery shed at the depot. Our staff carried out all the work and it has come up a treat. This will enable us to park our plant and equipment under cover, away from the elements and offer protection. The shade sails over the play equipment have now been installed and they are very bright and cheerful.

Work has commenced on the re-development of the Oasis visitor stay area as well as the re-development of the 'Post Office Building'. Both of these projects will take sometime before we see work commence as they require a lengthy input from Landscape Architects as well as Heritage Architects.

The Shire has received funding from the Tourism Council to construct the Recreational Vehicle Park, this will be finished off once the grader and roller are back in town. The works crew are in the final stages of finishing our Kali Road commitments under the Regional Roads funding arrangements. The Shire's engineers have commenced designing the tender document for Beringarra Road and this will go out to tender once Council is happy with the document. A number of new bores have been established as part of the Flood Damage works and these will assist with the reconstruction of these roads as well as provide a valuable resource for future works. The Flood Damage reconstruction works are due to start within the next three weeks, I urge all community members to take caution around these works.

The Mid West Development Commission is coming to town on the 23rd of October 2014 to deliver the Mid West Blue Print for the region. All community members are welcome to attend Council Chambers at 7.30pm on the 23rd of October.

A new Tourism Brochure has been finalised and this will go to print in the next week. This brochure is very attractive and provides a host of information for our visitors.

New floor coverings to replace the carpet in the Hall have been ordered and these should be laid within the next month.

The Shire's new Town Planning Scheme has received approval from the Minister to be advertised for public comment after considerable input from the various government agencies. A copy of the document is available in the office should you wish to review its contents, a word of warning it is a very large document.

Work is due to commence on the new Power Station which is located in the new Industrial Sub-division. Works in relation to the sub-division will commence shortly.

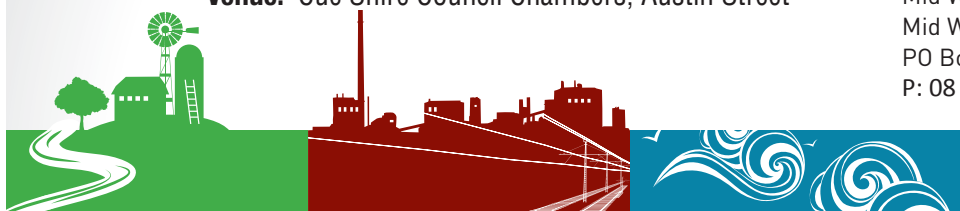

Notice is hereby given that the local government of the Shire of Cue has prepared the abovementioned local planning scheme and local planning strategy for the purpose of:

Local Planning Scheme

1. setting out the local government's planning aims and intentions for the scheme area;
2. setting aside land as reserves for public purposes;
3. zoning land within the scheme area for the purposes defined in the scheme;
4. controlling and guiding land use and development;
5. setting out procedures for the assessment and determination of planning applications;
6. making provision for the administration and enforcement of the scheme;
7. implementing the vision, objectives and recommendations within the future local planning strategy for the Shire; and
8. addressing other matters set out in Schedule 4 of the *Planning and Development Act 2005*.

Local Planning Strategy

1. setting out the long-term planning directions for the Shire over the next ten to 15 years and establishes strategies and actions in the context of the State, regional and local planning framework; and
2. establishing the rationale for land use, planning and development controls within proposed Local Planning Scheme No 2.

Plans and documents setting out and explaining the local planning scheme and local planning strategy have been deposited at Council Offices, Austin Street, Cue and at the Western Australian Planning Commission, 140 William Street, Perth, and will be available for inspection during office hours up to and including 16 December 2014.

Submissions on the local planning scheme and local planning strategy may be made in writing on Form No 4 and lodged with the undersigned on or before 16 December 2014.

Artificial lawn has a number of bebenfits:

Construction involves a 60mm thick base course compacted and screeded to the required levels. Installation of the synthetic grass using industry approved tape and adhesive and a silica sand infill. ***The cost for supply and installation for 400 square metres is around \$29,000 ex gst.***

October Trivia

October is another month with two birthstone choices – **Tourmaline** and **Opal**. **Tourmaline** has become a favourite gemstone among jewellery designer, and gem collectors the world over. Since it is available in a wide variety of colours, it is ideally suited to almost anyone's taste.

October Birth Flower

The October flower is Marigold.

They were first discovered in the 16th century by the Portuguese in Central America who then introduced the flower to parts of Europe and India.

In Aztec culture the marigold was believed to have magical religious and medicinal properties, which date back to 1552 when herbal records show they were used to cure hiccups and anyone injured from being struck by lightning. A magical use of the flower was when it was used to protect sailors who carried it for safe passage over rivers and other bodies of water.

In ancient South Asia marigolds were popular and held great value. The bright golden colour of the flower resembled that of honorable people known as Ayra. The flower was so valuable that it was used as a decoration at various places of importance to the people of that day. As a result, it was common to find them lining ceremonial rooms and pavilions. Early Spanish explorers were said to have taken marigold seeds from the Aztecs in Spain, where they were grown in monastery gardens. From there marigold seed went to France and Africa.

In Mexico marigolds are also used as a decorative flower and are popular during All Saints Day and All Souls Day. They are also used in Hindu religious ceremonies. Marigolds were also made into garlands to decorate during harvest festivals and other items similar in colour, such as corn and peppers, were used in the ceremonial decorations.

RECIPE

Sweet potato, pesto and spinach and fetta roulade

Roulade

40g unsalted butter
1/4 cup (35g) plain flour
1 cup (250ml) milk
60 g finely grated Parmesan
3 eggs separated
Fresh herbs and Parmesan shavings, to serve

Filling

500g sweet potato, peeled, chopped
1/4 cup (60ml) thin cream
150g baby spinach leaves
2 tablespoons pesto
150g fetta, crumbled



Step 1

Preheat oven to 200°C. Grease and line a 28 x 32cm shallow Swiss roll tin with non-stick baking paper. Melt butter in a small pan over low-medium heat, add flour and stir for 1 minute. Remove from heat. Gradually whisk in milk. Return to heat and cook, whisking continuously, until mixture boils and thickens. Remove from the heat. Stir in half the parmesan and egg yolks. Transfer the mixture to a large bowl. Set aside to cool for 5 minutes. Whisk eggwhites in a large, clean bowl until firm peaks form. Fold a third of the beaten egg whites into the cheese mixture, then fold in the remaining mixture in 2 batches using a large metal spoon. Pour the mixture into prepared tray and carefully spread to the edges. Bake for 10-15 minutes or until golden.

Step 2

Meanwhile, to make the sweet potato filling, cook the sweet potato in salted boiling water for 8-10 minutes or until tender. Drain and mash with the cream and pepper. Season well and set aside

Step 3

For the spinach filling, place the spinach in a large heatproof bowl and cover with boiling water. Set aside for 30 seconds or until wilted. Drain. Refresh under cold running water. Squeeze to remove excess liquid. Coarsely chop the spinach and place in a bowl with the pesto and fetta and mix to combine.

Step 4

Place a clean tea towel on a work surface. Lay over a large sheet of non-stick baking paper. Sprinkle with remaining parmesan. Turn the roulade onto the tea towel and remove the baked on paper. Starting from the shortest side closest to you and using the tea-towel as a guide, carefully roll up the roulade with the clean sheet of baking paper enclosed. Leave for 3-4 minutes. Carefully unroll and leave to cool slightly for 3-5 minutes. Spread the sweet potato filling evenly over the roulade and top with the spinach mixture. Reroll the roulade this time without the paper and the filling is enclosed. Serve topped with some fresh herbs and parmesan shavings. Delicious served warm or cold.

"You can't tell the difference between a simple blessing and the Last Rites."

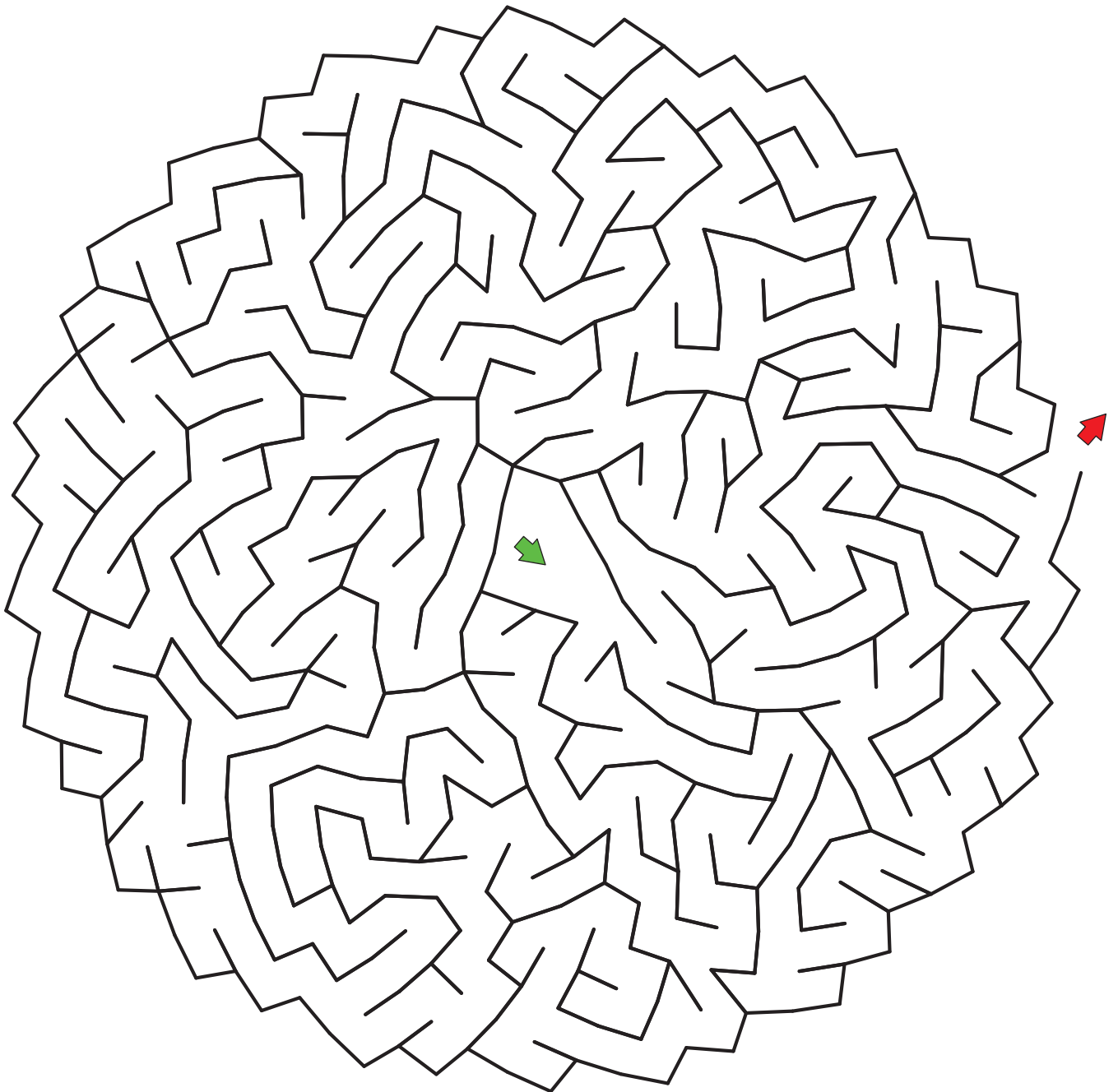

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Gardening Tips

With the weather warming up nicely, there's no better place to be than the backyard. October is a huge month in the patch. With so many varieties to plant, you'll be struggling to get it all done. So, welcome to October, a fine time to be in any sort of garden. Remember to use all your senses in the garden. Watch for pest issues, feel for soil moisture, smell your soil, and... most importantly... taste the fruits (or vegetables) of your labours. Let's get into it...

Weeding

Weeding is a great job to do at this time of year. Cut down the competition between your tasty treats and these space invaders, and tidy up your patch. It may sound tedious, but it's incredibly rewarding. While the kids are on school holidays, why not give them a "buck a bucket" for each bucket of weeds they remove? It gets them out in the sun, having fun and learning about nature.

Tomatoes

It's time to plant everyone's favourite – tomatoes. By now your soil should be good and ready, so head to the local garden centre, pick a few varieties, and get going. This is the moment we have all been waiting for. Don't forget their mates Basil and French Marigolds. They are great companions, and no tomato patch is complete without them.

Sunflowers

Now is the time to plant some sunflower seeds. Find a sunny spot where you would like to see some happy sunflowers later in the year, and plant the seeds to double the depth of the seed. Cover lightly with dirt and wait... they'll be popping their heads up in no time!

Remember to mulch

Top up mulch on your veggie patches, herb gardens and ornamental beds. Choose a sustainable, low environmental impact mulch that will enrich your soil as it breaks down.

Tools

On non gardening days head out to the shed, and sharpen, clean, oil and maintain your garden tools. It's really rewarding and will save you money and plant problems in the long run.

Green Manure

Consider a green manure crop to add some life and love to an overworked garden. At this time of year, try clover, pigeon pea or soybean. This will improve your soil incredibly and you'll find it well worth the effort. Young wheat is great too, it is used to make wheat grass... an incredibly vile tasting but very beneficial health tonic. Green manure crops, including clover, barley, millet and wheat are good to go now to improve that dormant veggie patch and get ready for

next season's heavy feeding plants.

Warm Areas

Frost free or occasional light frosts (North from about Coffs Harbour and all the way across to the west to Geraldton)

Why not give these a try: capsicum, spring onions, cucumber, pumpkins, squash, zucchini, rosella, sweet corn, eggplant and watermelon. For some super herbs try basil (both sweet and purple), parsley, sage, pyrethrum, lemongrass, oregano, rue and marjoram. Mint is ready to go, but you might want to keep it in a nice sized pot to prevent a serious mint invasion. Feeling fruity? There is still time to plant passionfruit, paw paw, avocados, banana, citrus, and macadamias. If your tastes are a little more exotic try putting in a guava.

Why not try some flowering plants as well. Try nasturtium, dianthus, Livingstone daisies, verbena, snapdragons, petunias, chrysanthemums, Shasta daisies, marigolds (French) or celosia. These are all great at attracting pollinators and beneficial insects to your garden.

This continues for the week and will see us spend two nights at Mt Augustus before finishing up in Geraldton with an Awards night finale upon completion where friends and family are invited to join us.

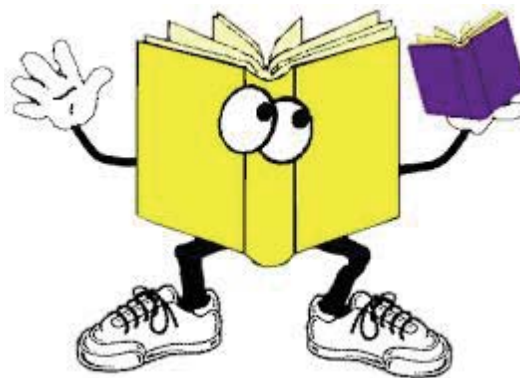
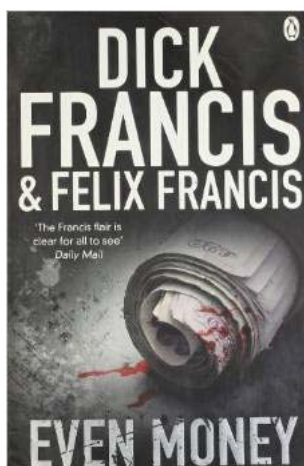

book review



With the racing season upon us I thought it was time to trawl through my book shelf and as one who quite enjoyed reading Dick Francis I could no go past reviewing one of his many many books which with one or two exceptions were always centred around horse racing and its environs.

Well known mystery writer and retired steeplechase jockey Dick Francis again teams up with his son Felix, a high school physics teacher and international-class marksman, to write "Even Money", their latest novel. Fans of the highly successful Dick Francis "formula" will be in their element here, as this is a fast-paced story with the usual twists and turns. In "Even Money", small-time bookie Ned Talbot plies his trade at Royal Ascot and at smaller racecourses in the southern half of England, with his intelligent techie assistant Luca by his side. They eke out meagre profits or even suffer losses when favourites keep winning. In typical Francis fashion, things are never quite what they seem. The day-in day-out grind of the bookie's life is quickly broken up when a man who claims to be his father meets him in the parking lot at Ascot and then is murdered by two thugs. Suddenly Ned finds himself with more questions than answers. Was that really his father, where was he all this time, and why did he come back? What are all these strange objects in his father's rucksack? And more importantly, who killed him and for what motive? Ned has to find answers these questions and more, while at the same time running his bookmaking business, avoiding the police who consider him a suspect and don't trust him, and visiting his wife Sophie in hospital.

In order to solve the mysteries, Ned travels all over England as well as to Ireland and Australia, meets up with underworld characters and family members, with physical violence, race fixing and illegal betting strategies employed. The character of Luca is frequently used to explain

the technologies to his boss but also to the reader, and at times you get the impression that the Ned and Luca "team" mirrors the father and son team that worked together on this project. As well, the book includes a bookmaker's odds chart in an appendix to assist those unfamiliar with the traditional British odds scale,

Dick Francis was one of the most successful post-war National Hunt jockeys. On his retirement from the saddle, he published his autobiography, *The Sport of Queens*, before going on to write forty-three bestselling novels, a volume of short stories and the biography of Lester Piggott.

Dick Francis died in February, 2010, at the age of 89, but he remains one of the greatest thriller writers of all time.

Felix Francis is the younger of Dick's two sons. Since 2006, Felix has taken a more significant role in the writing, first with *Dead Heat* and then increasingly with the bestsellers, *Silks* and *Even Money*. *Crossfire* is the fourth novel of this father-and-son collaboration.



The Flemington track where the Melbourne Cup is run has a circumference of 2312 metres and a home straight of 450 metres in length.

Cups king Bart Cummings was strapper for his father's horse Comic Court when he won the Cup in 1950. Cummings then trained 11 winners in his own right – 1965 Light Fingers, 1966 Galilee, 1967 Red Handed, 1974 and 1975 Think Big, 1977 Gold And Black, 1979 Hyperno, 1990 Kingston Rule, 1991 Let's Elope, 1996 Saintly and 1999 Rogan Josh.

Archer won the first two runnings of the Melbourne Cup in 1861 and 1862. He didn't receive a cup for winning the race – he got prizemoney of \$1420 plus a gold watch. Sasanof in 1916 was the first winner to get a cup as a trophy.

The fastest ever Cup was run in 1990 by Kingston Rule who recorded 3.16.3.

The slowest Cup ever run is shared between the inaugural winner Archer in 1861 and the 1864 winner Lantern who both recorded 3.52.0.

The first metric running of the Melbourne Cup was in 1972. The two mile distance became 3200 metres.

The shortest priced favourite ever to win a Melbourne Cup was champion Phar Lap in 1930 that started 11/8 on. He started even money in 1929 and ran third.

The biggest field to line up in a Melbourne Cup was 39 in Carbine's Cup of 1890.

The biggest weight carried to victory in a Cup was 10 stone 5 pounds (65.5kgs) by Carbine in 1890. Only two other winners carried 10 stone or more (63.5 kilos). Archer when he won his second Cup in 1862 carried 10 stone 2 pounds (64.5kgs) and Poitrel in 1920 carried 10 stone (63.5kgs).

The smallest field to contest the Cup was in 1863 when Banker beat just six rivals.

The only mares in history to win both the Caulfield and Melbourne Cups are Rivette (1939), Let's Elope (1991) and Ethereal (2001).

Former New Zealand trainer Sheila Laxon was the first woman to train a Cup winner when Ethereal won in 2001.

Australian media mogul Kerry Packer reportedly had A\$1 million for a win on Might And Power at around 6-1 when it won in a close photo in 1997.

Four horses have won the Cup twice. Archer 1861-62, Peter Pan 1932 and 1934, Rain Lover 1968-69 and Think Big 1974-75.

Only one horse "Makybe Diva" has won the race three times. She won in 2003, 2004 and 2005. She also has the distinction of holding the weight carrying record for a mare when she carried 58 kilograms to victory in 2005.

Two dead heats for placings have happened in Melbourne Cup history. The 1933 Topical and Gaine Carrington dead heated for third and in 1999 Zazabelle and Lahar also deadheated for third.

Eleven horses have won the Caulfield Cup and Melbourne Cup in the same year: 1906 Poseidon, 1937 The Trump, 1939 Rivette, 1954 Rising Fast, 1962 Even Stevens, 1966 Galilee, 1982 Gurner's Lane, 1991 Let's Elope, 1995 Doriemus, 1997 Might And Power, 2001 Ethereal.

1871 winner The Pearl, 1936 winner Wotan and Old Rowley in 1940 all started at 100-1.

Jockey P. St Albans is accredited as being the youngest hoop to win the Cup – he was only 13 in 1876.

The Barb in 1869 carried 11 stone 7 pounds (73 kilograms) and ran unplaced. That remains the highest weight ever carried by a Cup runner.

1880 Cup winner Grand Flaneur is the only horse in the long history of the race to go into it unbeaten.

Maree Lyndon became the first female to ride in the Melbourne Cup when she partnered Argonaut Style in 1987. It ran second last in the 21 horse field.

From 1900 onwards, the only father and son combination to win the Melbourne Cup was Billy Cook (Skipton 1941 and Rainbird 1945) and his son Peter who won in 1981 on Just A Dash and 1984 on Black Knight.

Numerous horses have been placed in two cups without winning but Shadow King in the 1930's set a record which will never be equalled. He ran in six Melbourne Cups – he ran second in 1931 and 1933 and third in 1930 and 1932. He also ran a fourth and a sixth.

The Melbourne Cup field is now set at a maximum of 24 starters with no emergencies. The VRC Derby winner – from the previous month – is exempt from the Melbourne Cup ballot.

History reports the first great plunge landed on the Cup was when a Chinese market gardener called Jimmy Ah Poon won a fortune when in 1906 a horse called Poseidon won the Caulfield Cup, VRC Derby and Melbourne Cup. Jimmy Ah Poon is reported to have returned to China with 35,000 pounds (\$70,000) – a veritable fortune.

Ireland has had success bringing their stayers to our country. Dermot Weld has won two Cups with Vintage Crop in 1993 and Media Puzzle in 2002.



HERE are 24 facts to impress serious punters and dazzle the once-a-year flutterers alike.

1. Your shout

The crowd at the first Cup was a measly 4000. Bar access was probably a lot easier, though.

2. Race day

In 1875, the Cup was run on a Tuesday for the first time.

3. Backing up

Just five horses have won more than one Cup. Apart from Makybe Diva, they were Archer (1861 and 1862), Peter Pan (1932 and 1934), Rain Lover (1968 and 1969) and Think Big (1974 and 1975).

4. Going grey

Six grey horses have won the Cup including Subzero in 1992.

5. Not half bad

No trainer has half as many winners as Bart Cummings' 12. Lee Freedman and Etienne de Mestre are closest, with five each.

6. Walking shoes

The first winner, Archer, is said to have walked from Sydney to Melbourne in 1861, and again in 1862. Some sports historian now reckons he went by boat. Pffft.

7. Margin calls

Archer (1862) and Rain Lover (1968) hold the greatest winning margin of eight lengths.

8. Flemington fallout

There are 13 thoroughbred race meetings to bet on with the TAB on Cup day. There will also be countless non-TAB meetings around the country with bookies on course. Many racecourses now have their biggest crowd of the year on Melbourne Cup day, even though local fields are ordinary.

9. Never surrender

World War I and World War II stopped most major sport in Australia, but never the Melbourne Cup.

10. No luck

No horse has won from barrier 18 (right) since barriers were first introduced in 1924.

11. Dog day

The greyhound Melbourne Cup is also run in November.

12. Money fight!

Last year's Cup brought 26,000 international and interstate visitors to Melbourne and injected \$155 million into the Victorian economy.

13. Let it ride

Half an hour after the Melbourne Cup, you can bet on next year's race. You used to have wait until the following August.

14. Big winners

The saddlecloth numbers four and 12 have won the Cup a record 11 times.

15. Don't drink and ride

Jockeys in Victoria must have blood-alcohol readings under 0.02.

16. The Phrase That Stops A Nation

The phrase *The Race That Stops A Nation* is a trademark of the Victoria Racing Club. As if any idiot would be loopy enough to use it in another context.

17. Rushin'

What Australian sporting event did Russia win in 1946? Great trivia question, that. The answer is the Melbourne Cup. Russia was a horse. He won by three lengths.

18. Unhappy snap

The photo-finish camera was first used in 1948, giving Rimfire victory over Dark Marne. It was later found the camera was aligned incorrectly, but the result stood. We would have made this fact No.17, but our numbering system was out of alignment.

19. All rise

Long before Delta Blues won the 2006 Cup, Delta won the 1951 Cup. Oh, and Delta Goodrem sang the national anthem in 2007.

20. Wiki winners

Fifty-five Melbourne Cup winners have their own Wikipedia entries. So far.

21. Name game

Three-time winner Makybe Diva takes the first two letters from the names of millionaire owner Tony Santic's employees Maureen, Kylie, Belinda, Diane and Vanessa.

22. Skirt the truth

British model Jean Shrimpton shocked Flemington by wearing a miniskirt in 1965. She also wore no gloves, hat or stockings. The scandal is often wrongly reported as having happened on Cup day. In fact it was Derby day, three days earlier.

23. Mine's still running

In any given year, there are about 32,000 active racehorses in Australia. More than half of them have never won a race.

24. Everyone should know...

Phar Lap's heart was 6.2kg. The average horse heart weighs 3.2 kg.

"Yes," said the man gleefully. "Give her this \$100 and tell her Godspeed came in second at Belmont.

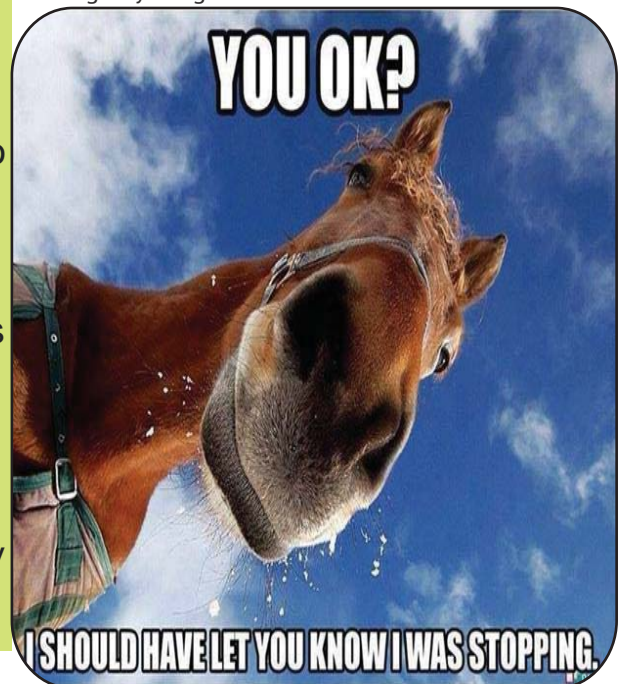
A horse walks into a smart cocktail bar.
