I need to draw everyone's attention to the state of our volunteer ambulance service.

Currently we have just two fully qualified officers (really just one as my broken elbow is not recovering as rapidly as I would like) and two qualified drivers.

This manpower is woefully inadequate for providing comprehensive coverage and places an almost intolerable burden on Ruth Lee.

Becoming a volunteer ambulance driver or attendant is actually great fun (well providing at least on my part it does not involve child birth!) . Initial training is normally conducted over a weekend, but St Johns community Paramedic is flexible and would arrange times to suit volunteers, there after we meet up once a week for about an hour to hone skills and swap "war stories". If we could attract say a dozen committed people then the roster would not be too demanding.

# From the C.E.O.s Desk

The past month has seen the completion of various projects and the commencement of new projects. New floor coverings have been laid in the Town Hall, the Caravan Park demountable toilet block and in the reception area of the Administration Building, replacing the carpet which was extremely difficult to keep clean. I have ordered the stainless steel

tree guard for the palm tree that goes through the new deck and this should be here within the next couple of weeks. Works will commence on the landscaping of the Hall area after Christmas as the next priority is to start work on Brockman Park.

Work is being undertaken on the new houses, with all three now having footpaths and patio areas paved/concreted. Outstanding works include retaining walls, reticulation and the installation of lawns / gardens. Lawns will be established once we sourced sufficient yellow sand so that we can lay roll on lawn.

The Austin Street underground reticulation system has been replaced with an above ground system. The new system will not be as water wise as the underground system but it will be far more reliable and we will be able to determine if there are any problems and rectify these before the lawn dies, like it has in the past. Evidence from removing some of underground pipe was that it was blocked with calcium deposits. It is also evident that Mount Magnet has also a problem with their underground watering system and they have now resorted to hand watering their lawns.

The Arthur Gurney Memorial Park gardens have now established themselves and the roses are starting to get a good head of colour.

The Shire has taken delivery of a second hand multi-tired roller. The roller originally came from the Shire of Yalgoo. We purchased the roller for \$10,000 and spent approximately \$25,000 on repairs, given that at budget allocation of \$75,000 was made a saving of \$40,000 or 53%. A second hand Water Tanker has been purchased for \$72,000. Quotes for new tankers ranged from \$106,000 through to \$116,000. The tanker is a Tri-Star Tri-axel Steel Tanker that has travelled 135,000km's. This purchase saved the Shire \$18,000 or 20%. The old tanker will have any leaks repaired and will be used as a storage tanker to service the Bush Fire Brigade or the Fire and Rescue Service. Finally we have taken delivery of a new Dual Cab Ford Ranger tray back 4 x 4.

I recently attended a meeting in Perth with the CEO's / President's of other Murchison Local Governments for the purpose of conveying to senior members of the Department of Racing, Gaming and Liquor that region wide Liquor restrictions were not warranted and that these would impact on the broader economic viability of businesses. I believe that our concerns were duly noted and it is hoped that they will be taken into account when a decision is made in respect to any Liquor restrictions that maybe imposed.

Kali Road is now complete in respect to works that we committed to undertake in our Regional Road Group funding application. Kali Road would be one of the best standard gravel roads in our region and it is a credit to our Road Works Crew. Work will commence on the Cue Wondinong Road, work will start at the 6.2 SLK mark and move back towards Patterson Street. This road will be reconstructed in the same manner as Kali Road with a 9m running surface between the hinge points with a 4% crown. Two of the corners that are very tight will be re-aligned to reduce the severity of the corner.

Finally I would like to advise that Mr Geoff Brooks, CEO for the Shire of Mount Magnet, has resigned and he has been replaced by Mr Warren Olsen. I would like to acknowledge Geoff's leadership in respect to the MRVC and also to the guidance he has provided to me over the past 18 months, Geoff along with the other CEO's of the region are very generous with their time and advice for the benefit of the entire region and he will be missed by all who had the opportunity to work with him.

### *Local Government Act 1995*

The Local Government has resolved to propose the Shire of Cue Standing Orders Local Law 2014.

The purpose of this local law is to repeal the principal Shire of Cue Standing Orders Local Law 2012 and replace with Shire of Cue Standing Orders Local Law 2014. The purpose of the local law is to allow for the orderly conduct of meetings of the Council and Committees.

The effect of this local law is to ensure that all Council and Committee meetings are governed by the Standing Orders unless otherwise provided for in the Local Government Act 1995 or Regulations.

# The Anzac on the wall

I wandered through a country town 'cos I had time to spare,  
And went into an antique shop to see what was in there.  
Old Bikes and pumps and kero lamps, but hidden by it all,  
A photo of a soldier boy – an Anzac on the Wall.

"The Anzac have a name?" I asked. The old man answered  
"No,.

The ones who could have told me mate, have passed on long ago."

The old man kept on talking and according to his tale,  
The photo was unwanted junk bought from a clearance sale.

"I asked around," the old man said, "but no one knows his face,  
He's been on that wall twenty years, deserves a better place.

For someone must have loved him so, it seems a shame  
somehow,"

I nodded in agreement and then said, "I'll take him now."

My nameless digger's photo, well it was a sorry sight,  
A cracked glass pane, and a broken frame - I had to make it  
right.

To prise the photo from the frame I took care just in case,  
'Cause only sticky paper held the cardboard back in place.

I peeled away the faded screed and much to my surprise,

Two letters and a telegram appeared before my eyes.

The first reveals my Anzac's name and regiment of course,  
John Mathew Francis Stuart - of Australia's own Light Horse.  
This letter written from the front, my interest now was keen,

This note was dated August seventh 1917.

'Dear Mum, I'm at Khalasa Springs not far from the Red Sea,  
They say it's in the Bible – looks like a Billabong to me".

My Kathy wrote I'm in her prayers she's still my bride to be,  
I just can't wait to see you both you're all the world to me.

And Mum you'll soon meet Bluey, last month they shipped him  
out,

I told him to call on you when he's up and about."

"That Bluey is a larrikin and we all thought it funny,

He lobbed a Turkish hand grenade in the CO's dunny.

I told you he dragged me in wounded from no man's land,  
He stopped the bleeding closed the wound with only his bare  
hands."

"Then he copped it at the front with some stray shrapnel blast,  
It was my turn to drag him in and I thought he wouldn't last.

He woke up in hospital and nearly lost his mind,  
Cause out there on the battlefield he'd left one leg behind."

'He's been in a bad way mum, he knows he'll ride no more,

Like me he loves a horse's back, he was a champ before.

So please Mum can you take him in, he's been like my brother,  
Raised in a Queensland orphanage he's never known a mother.

"But struth, I miss Australia mum and in my mind each day,

I am a mountain cattleman on high plains far away.

I'm mustering white-faced cattle, with no camels hump in  
sight,

And I waltz my Matilda by a campfire every night.

I wonder who rides Billy, I heard the pub burnt down,

I'll always love you, and please say hooroo to all in town".

The second letter I could see was in a lady's hand,

An answer to her soldier son there in a foreign land.

Her copperplate was perfect, the pages neat and clean,

It bore the date November 3<sup>rd</sup> 1917.

"T'was hard enough to lose your Dad, without you at the war,  
I'd hope you would be home by now – each day I miss you  
more."

Your Kathy calls around a lot since you have been away,

To share with me her hopes and dreams about a wedding day.

And Bluey has arrived – and what a godsend he has been,

We talked and laughed for days about the things you've done  
and see

"He really is a comfort and works hard around the farm,

I read the same hope in his eyes that you won't come to harm.

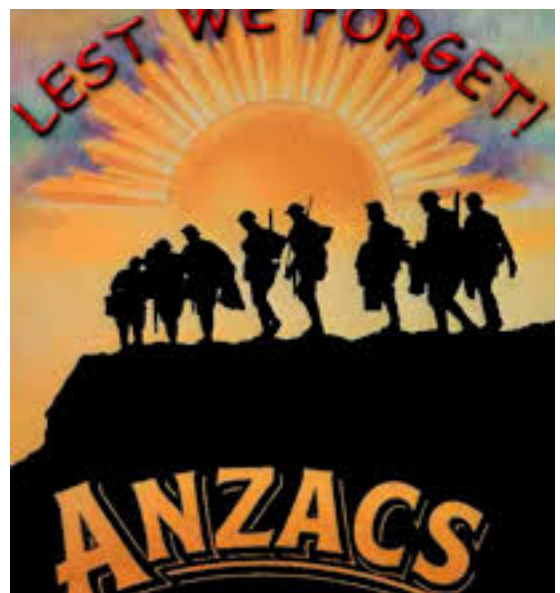
McConnell's kids rode Billy but suddenly that's changed,

We had a violent lightning storm and it really was strange."



Last Wednesday just on midnight, not a cloud insight,  
 It raged for several minutes, it gave us all a fright.  
 It really spooked your billy – and he screamed and bucked and reared,  
 And then he rushed the sliprail fence, which by a foot he cleared.”  
 “They bought him back next afternoon but something’s changed I fear,  
 It’s like the day you bought him home, for no one can get near.  
 Remember when you caught him with his black and flowing mane?,  
 Now horse breakers fear the beast that only you can tame,”  
 “That’s why we need you home son” – Then the flow of ink went dry,  
 This letter was unfinished and I couldn’t work out why.  
 Until I started reading letter number three,  
 A yellow telegram delivered news of tragedy.  
 Her son killed in action - oh - what pain that must have been,  
 The same day as her letter -3<sup>rd</sup> November 1917  
 This letter that was never sent, became hen one of three.  
 She sealed behind the photo’s face – the face she longed to see.  
 And Johns home town ‘s old timers – children when he went to war,  
 Would say no greater cattleman had left the town before.  
 They knew his widowed mother well – and with respect did tell,  
 How when she lost her only boy she lost her mind as well.  
 She could not face the awful truth, to strangers she would speak,  
 “My Johnny’s at the war you know, he’s coming home next week.”  
 They all remembered bluey, he stayed on till the end,  
 A younger man with wooden leg became her closest friend.  
 And he would go and find her when she wandered old and weak,  
 And always softly say, “Yes dear - John will be home next week.”  
 Then when she died Bluey moved on, to Queensland some did say,  
 I tried to find out where he went but don’t know till this day.  
 And Kathy never wed – a lonely spinster some found odd,  
 She wouldn’t set foot in a church – she’d turned her back on god.  
 John’s mother left no will I learned on my detective trail,  
 This explains my photo’s journey, that clearance sale.  
 So I continued digging ‘cause I wanted to know more,  
 I found John’s name with thousands in the records of the war.  
 His last ride proved his courage – a ride you will act 15im,

The light horse charge at Beersheba of everlasting fame.  
 The last day in October back in 1917,  
 At 4pm our brave boys fell – that sad fact I did glean.  
 That’s when John’s life was sacrificed, the records crystal clear,  
 But 4pm in Beersheba is midnight over here.....  
 So as John’s gallant spirit rose to cross the great divide,  
 Where lightning bolts back home a signal from the other side?  
 Is that why Billy bolted and went racing as in pain,  
 Because he’d never feel his master on his back again?  
 Was it coincidental? Same time – same day – same date?  
 Some proof of numerology, or just a quirk of fate?  
 I think its more than that , you know, as I’ve heard wiser men,  
 Acknowledge there are many things that go beyond our ken.  
 Where craggy peaks guard secrets neath dark skies torn asunder,  
 Where hoof beats are companions to the rolling waves of thunder.  
 Where lightning cracks like 303’s and ricochets again,  
 Where howling moaning gusts of wind sound just like dying men.  
 Some Mountain cattlemen have sworn on lonely alpine track,  
 They’ve glimpsed a huge black stallion – Light Horseman on his back.  
 Yes sceptics say, it’s swirling clouds just forming apparitions,  
 Oh no, my friend you can’t dismiss this all as superstition.  
 The desert of Beersheba – or windswept Aussie range,  
 John Stuart rides forever there – Now I don’t find that strange.  
 Now some gaze at this photo and they often question me,  
 And I tell them a small white lie, and say he’s family.  
 “You must be proud of him.” they say – I tell them, one and all,  
 That’s why he takes pride of place my Anzac on the Wall.

# November Trivia

## November in Australia.

1 November 1911 compulsory military training was introduced.

The early Federal Government introduced compulsory military training at the instigation of Lord Kitchener, who inspected and advised on Australia's defence forces in 1910.

18 November 1916                      Somme Campaign ends

After four months and more than 1,200,000 casualties on both sides, General Douglas Haig calls of the failed Somme offensive.

3 November 1918                      Armistice with Austria-Hungary signed

With Turkey having already signed an armistice Germany was left to confront the allies alone for the remaining days of the war.

11 November 1918                      Germany signs Armistice

Germany signs an armistice ending the fighting on the Western Front. The First World War ended at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month.

27 November 1939                      Inauguration of the Empire Air Training Scheme

Over 37,000 Australian airmen trained under the scheme, in Canada and Rhodesia, one of the Commonwealth's greatest achievements in wartime.

10 November 1964                      Selective conscription introduced

Australian Government introduces selective conscription of 20 year old males by ballot under National Service Act. The National Service Scheme saw 19,450 young men serve in Vietnam.

12 November 1943                      Last Japanese air raid on Darwin

This the 64<sup>th</sup> raid since February 1942, saw a conclusion of the air war fought across Northern Australia.

2 November 1942                      Kokoda airstrip re- occupied

The capture of Kokoda, New Guinea, and it's airstrip enabled the Australian advance across the Owen Stanley Range to continue.

# RECIPE

## Beef baguettes with mustard and cranberry dressing



### Ingredients

4 x 90g lean beef minute steaks  
Olive oil spray  
1 large baguette, cut into four, split  
2 tomatoes, sliced  
2 cups (50g) watercress sprigs  
1/2 red onion, thinly sliced

### Mustard & cranberry dressing

1 1/2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil  
2 teaspoons white wine vinegar  
2 teaspoons wholegrain mustard  
1 tablespoon cranberry sauce

### Step 1

Pound the steaks with a meat mallet until about 2mm thick. Spray with oil and season with salt and pepper.

### Step 2

Heat a frypan over high heat. Cook the steaks, 2 at a time, for 30 seconds each side for medium or until cooked to your liking. Rest for 3 minutes, then slice.

### Step 3

Meanwhile, for the dressing, whisk ingredients with 1 tablespoon boiling water until combined. Season to taste.

### Step 4

Fill the baguette pieces with tomato, watercress, onion, sliced steaks and any beef juices. Drizzle over the mustard dressing and serve immediately.

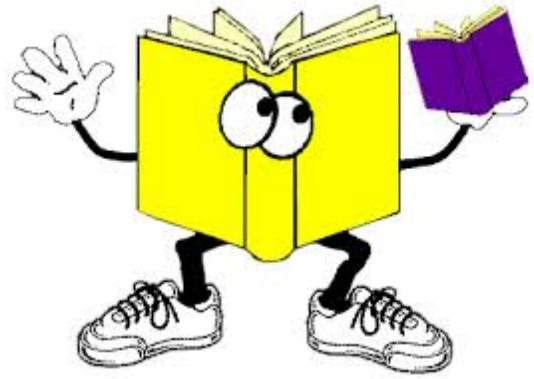

# book review



I have been watching "The Resurrection" on the T.V. and noticed it was based on "The Returned" by Jason Mott.

Jason Mott's debut novel poses, explores a compelling premise, what if the people you once loved, and lost, come back?

Nearly fifty years after Harold and Lucille's son drowned tragically on his eighth birthday, Jacob is Returned to them having been found alongside a river bank in China. Their son is just one of many who have returned from the dead, as bewildered by their resurrection as are the 'True Living', with no memory of their passing or their absence.

The world is torn, are the Returned a miracle or a sign of 'the end of days'? An infection or a blessing? People or monsters? While some welcome the reunion with their loved ones, others shun them. Fear, jealousy, even resentment and regret amongst some of the 'True Living' engenders outbreaks of protests and violence. The American government, unable to explain the phenomena, eventually responds by segregating The Returned, housing them in increasingly overcrowded guarded camps.

The Hargraves' story of Jacob's Return is intertwined with tales from other Returned individuals including an artist whose fame came only posthumously, a cluster of Nazi soldiers, a family man and a girl murdered in war torn Sierra Leone. These snippets provide additional perspective and mystery.

For some readers the lack of explanation about the how's and the why's of the Returned may be a source of frustration but I was pleased that Mott didn't attempt to make sense of it. There are more important questions to be asked and answered about 'faith and morality, love and responsibility', about humanity and the meaning of life. I was impressed by the way in which Mott navigated issues like religion and more prosaic concerns like the strain on resources resulting from a population explosion.

The Returned is a remarkable, captivating read and its questions will haunt you long after you have turned the last page. If your loved one was Returned to you, what would you do?

Mammals are the only animals with flaps around the ears.

The South American giant anteater eats more than 30,000 ants a day. **Sharks** are immune to almost all known diseases.

It is impossible to out-swim a shark – sharks

Sharks and rays also share the same kind of skin: instead of scales, they have small tooth-like spikes called denticles. The spikes are so sharp that shark skin has long been used as sandpaper.

Animals also are either right-handed or left-handed. Polar bears are left-handed – and so is Kermit the Frog.

There are 701 types of pure breed dogs. There are about 54 million dogs in the US, and Paris is said to have more dogs than people.

Some **bird species**, usually flightless birds, have only a lower eyelid, whereas pigeons use upper and lower lids to blink.
