SHIRE NOTES

Bill Atyeo has commenced duties as the Shire's Environmental Health Officer/Building Surveyor. Bill takes over from Phil Swain, who recently resigned from the position to take on additional duties at the Shire of Ngaanyatjaraku. Bill will be in attendance at the Shire Office one day per month and will attend at other times on a needs basis. Health and building applications lodged with the Shire in between visits will be processed by email. As Bill also services the Shires of Meekatharra and Mount Magnet, he will be passing through town regularly and will be able to inspect building progress as necessary.

Filming of some of the final scenes for the movie *The Decadent and Depraved* were recently completed at Melangata Station, with several Shire staff taking on roles as extras. Parts of the movie were filmed at locations around Cue, including the opening scene which features Lake Austin. The movie is expected to be released late in 2017. Following the premiere in Perth, a special screening will be held in the Shire Hall.

The Shire recently took delivery of a new Caterpillar 12M grader, the first new grader in the Shire for eighteen years. The new machine will increase productivity during construction, while the old grader has been kept in the Shire's fleet for use on the road maintenance program.



The next stage of the Shire's footpath program involves the construction of dual use paths on Robinson Street, from Wittenoom Street to Austin Street, and Marshall Street, from Austin Street to Dowley Street. The contract for this work has been awarded to Axis Contracting. Work is expected to commence on 10 October 2016.

The due date for rates is 12 October. Ratepayers who pay their rates in full by this date will qualify for an entry into the rates incentive prize draw. First prize is \$600 cash, second \$300 and third \$100.

POLICE BEAT

Hello Everyone,

Well there goes another month and only 12 more weeks until 2017, that is a scary thought. September was another busy month for us, not only in Cue but assisting both Mount Magnet and Meekatharra for their annual race rounds.

Traffic Offences

From the period 18th August to the end of September Cue Police seized three vehicles, each subject to a 28 day period of impounding as a result of people driving with a cancelled licence. We do not have any discretion in relation to seizing vehicles, if you are stopped by police and your licence is court cancelled or suspended, your vehicle WILL be seized. You are then responsible for all towing and storage costs associated with the vehicle.

For that same period a further 8 people were charged with other driving offences including driving with an expired licence, driving under fine suspension, never holding a licence and driving contrary to the conditions of an extraordinary licence.

Crime

Drugs

On the 2nd of September 2016 Cue Police stopped a vehicle on Austin Street, Cue. As a result of a vehicle search a quantity of Cannabis and smoking implements were seized with a male person being summonsed to court.

On the 16th September 2016, Cue Police stopped a vehicle heading south on Great Northern Hwy, Shire of Mt Magnet. As a result of a vehicle search police located a smoking implement used for smoking Cannabis. The male driver was summonsed to Cue Court.

Assault

On the 18th September 2016, Cue Police received a call regarding a domestic violence incident in Cue. As a result of inquiries a male person was charged with Aggravated Unlawful Wounding and Aggravated Assault Occasioning Bodily Harm. He was subsequently placed on protective bail conditions to attend Cue Court at a later date.

For the month of September, Cue Police charged a total of 11 people for various offences.

LATE NEWS

The Shire has received notification that the final grant required for the redevelopment of the old Post Office has been approved by the Federal Government. The contribution of \$300,000 from the National Stronger Regions Fund, together with \$305,000 already approved from LotteryWest and \$200,000 from the Mid West Development Commission, will enable the building to be re-fitted to accommodate the new Community and Visitor's Centre.

It will be fantastic to see the Post Office building back in use again, and I know that Ruth and her team at the CRC will appreciate the extra space and modern facilities.

The new Centre will complement the development of the proposed Oasis Visitor Stop at the Corner of Victoria and Austin Streets. While planning is still underway for the installation of the physical infrastructure for this project, it is anticipated that the free access public WiFi hotspot will be operational within the next few weeks.

Easy Butter Chicken



Ingredients

- 1/2 cup plain Farmers Union Greek Style Yoghurt
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 3cm piece ginger, peeled, finely grated
- 2 teaspoons ground cumin
- 2 teaspoons ground coriander
- 1 teaspoon garam masala
- 1/4 teaspoon chilli powder
- 600g chicken thigh fillets, trimmed, cut into 3cm pieces
- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 20g butter
- 1 brown onion, halved, thickly sliced
- 410g can tomato puree
- 1/2 cup Campbell's Real Stock Chicken
- 1/2 cup thickened cream
- SunRice Basmati Rice
- coriander leaves, to serve

Method

Step 1.

1. Place yoghurt, garlic, ginger, cumin, coriander, garam masala and chilli powder in a glass or ceramic dish. Add chicken. Stir to coat. Cover. Refrigerate for 2 hours.

Step 2

1. Heat oil and butter in a heavy-based saucepan over medium-high heat. Add onion. Cook, stirring occasionally, for 3 to 4 minutes or until softened. Add chicken mixture to pan. Cook, stirring, for 5 minutes or until chicken just starts to change colour. Add tomato puree and stock. Cover. Bring to the boil. Reduce heat to low. Simmer, stirring occasionally, for 10 minutes or until chicken is tender and mixture has thickened slightly.

Step 3

Stir in cream. Simmer for a further 5 minutes or until heated through. Serve with steamed rice and coriander leaves.

Kidsafe WA's 'Do Not Leave Children in Cars' campaign aims to raise community awareness and reduce the number of children left unattended in parked cars in Western Australia.

Each year approximately 5,000 Australian children are rescued from parked cars. Three-quarters of those children are under four years old. Even on a cool day the temperature in a parked car can be over 30 degrees hotter than outside. In fact, 75% of the total temperature rise can occur within the first five minutes of parking a car. This is why it is important to take children with you, even when running a quick errand.

Kidsafe WA has designed 'Do Not Leave Children in Cars' car park signs that can be purchased by organisations to install in car parks to remind community members to take their children with them after parking the car. Kidsafe WA is seeking your help to spread the message and display these signs in your local car parks.

Handy Tip:

Difference between Westlink and Video Conferencing.

Westlink is a satellite TV system and require no internet or login.

All that is needed is an authorised satellite receiver, which we call a SatBox.

Video Conferencing (including Being There as used by the CRCs) is an internet based application.

It requires a computer, laptop, tablet or phone that is connected to the internet.

The quality and speed of your internet determines the quality of your video conference.

It is possible to just use the camera and mic on your device, but external cameras and mics deliver better results in most cases.

It is possible to take the HDMI output from a laptop and feed it into the same TV you view Westlink on.

Simply connect the HDMI out of the laptop to a spare HDMI input on the TV.

You may need to reduce the volume on the TV to stop feedback.

We suggest you place a label near TV designating which input is which on the TV.

Another idea is to print out instructions for each device, laminate and colour code and use the same colour code on the remote associated with the device.

Did you know as a country patient you can attend some of your specialist medical appointments using videoconferencing?

Thanks to telehealth, country outpatients often now have access to specialists via telehealth – using videoconferencing to allow you to have face to face appointments with your doctors without having to visit Perth.

This saves you the time, money and the inconvenience of having to travel long distances for relatively short specialist visits.

The free telehealth service is available for a wide range of clinics including burns, wounds, pain management, speech pathology, gastroenterology, neurology, urology, paediatrics, mental health and many more.

After you've made an appointment, you simply visit your closest telehealth-enabled health service and the staff will connect you via videoconference to your specialist at their Perth hospital.

Back to School Lunch Ideas



Vietnamese rice paper rolls

These Vietnamese rice paper rolls are full of fresh flavours and taste just like the ones you buy in restaurants. Making these at home is so easy and the kids can fill them up with their favourite fillings.

ingredients

- 12 x 22cm round rice papers
- 1 Lebanese cucumber, cut into short thin strips
- 1 small red capsicum, cut into short, thin strips
- 1 large carrot, cut into short thin strips
- 1 small avocado, cut into short thin slices
- 50g snow pea sprouts, ends trimmed
- 3/4 cup coriander leaves
- 3/4 cup mint leaves
- 55g unsalted roasted peanuts, finely chopped
- 3 tbsp Maggi Sweet Chilli Sauce
- 1 1/2 tbsp soy sauce
- 3 tbsp fresh lime juice

method

1. Place all the vegetables on a platter, ready to roll.
2. Combine the soy sauce, sweet chilli sauce and lime juice and mix well.
3. Soak one rice paper roll in a bowl of warm water for a few seconds, until soft, then place a few pieces of each of the remaining ingredients on the wrapper, about 3cm from the base.
4. Fold up the bottom of the the sides and roll up to enclose filling. Place on a tray and cover with damp paper towels. Repeat with the remaining wrappers and filling ingredients. Serve rice paper rolls with the dipping sauce.

Notes

- Add slices of barbecue chicken to make these more substantial. I just pick up a cooked chook from the supermarket for ease.
- If you're not a coriander fan, replace with flat leaf parsley instead.
- Kids like these with mild and sweet chilli sauce to dip the rolls into.
- You could add meat, noodles or vermicelli to this recipe.
- These are great to make for vegetarians. If your family prefer meat in their rolls however, pork or beef

2 ingredient energy bars

These delicious bars have just two ingredients and are perfect for school lunch boxes. There's no baking, no nuts and they are sweet and healthy too!



Ingredients

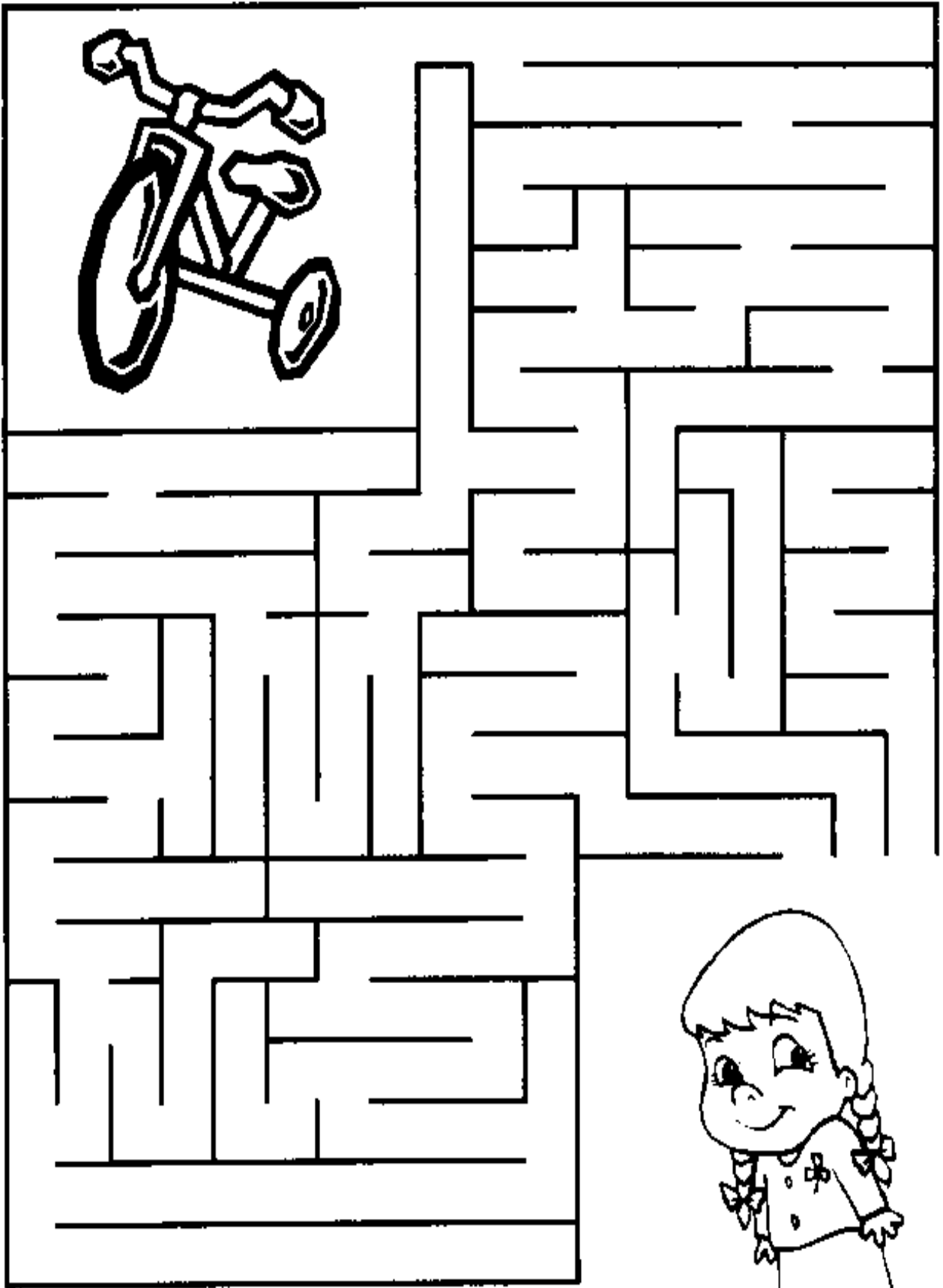
- 3 cups (600g) pitted dates
- 3 cups (420g) oats + extra for coating

Notes

1. Some people like to soak their dates overnight
2. You can also roll these in sesame seeds if you prefer.

1. Line a 17 x 27cm slice tin with baking paper and set aside. Place dates into a food processor and process until it has a jam-like consistency (you may need to add a touch of hot water if its too dry)
2. Add oats one cup at a time until it's all incorporated and the mix starts to pull away from the sides of the bowl. Press mixture into the tin.
3. Sprinkle top with oats and freeze for 1-2 hours.
4. Cut into fingers and roll in extra oats to coat. Wrap individual fingers in baking paper and store in an airtight container.





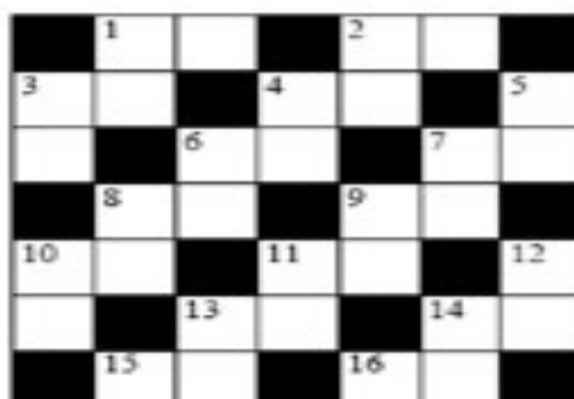
