I'd like to wish a warm welcome to all visitors to sunny Cue. I hope your stay is a pleasant and fruitful one.



The official opening of Brockman Park on 22 April was well supported, with over 100 community members and visitors braving the wet weather to acknowledge the milestone of achieving a long-term vision. Many thanks to Shire staff and other members of the community who pitched in at the last minute to prepare lunch when the conditions forced the event to be moved inside to the hall. Thanks also to the members of the extended Brockman family who provided the salads.

ANZAC Day attracted a large crowd of approximately 70 people for the dawn service. Thank you to our bugler, Graham Morphet, and the staff at the Murchison Club Hotel who provided a magnificent breakfast.

The Cue Oasis is in the final stages of construction, with landscaping currently under way. The addition of signage and line marking will mark the completion of this project.

The successful tenderer for the redevelopment of the Old Post Office building into the new Community and Visitor Centre, George Murray of Clinton Long Project Management, is due to hold an on-site meeting with architects Suzie Hunt and Steve Carrick on 10 May and sign the construction contract for the project. The new facility is expected to be completed by October, when the Community Resource Centre will be relocated from their current building in Robinson Street. The Shire library will also be located in this building.

The Shire welcomes two new staff members in Trevor Brimson as Road Crew Supervisor and Karen Scully who has commenced work in the office. Tim Jones has resigned from the Town Crew to return to Perth for family reasons.

The six-monthly meeting of the Murchison Country Zone of the WA Local Government Association, otherwise known as Cue Parliament, will be held at the Cue Community Hall on Thursday 4 May. Representatives from zone member councils will discuss issues of significance for the Murchison with members of Parliament and State Government officials.

On Tuesday 16 May at 4:30pm, the Shire will host the Kookoo Kookaburra show presented by Country Arts WA at the Community Hall. Kookoo Kookaburra is a morality tale designed for a young audience, set within the cultural context of the Dreamtime, written by teacher Gregg Dreise. Entry is free.

Yalgoo country races keeping community spirit alive in WA Midwest



The future of country racing was on the tongues of racegoers at the annual Yalgoo Races in Western Australia's midwest over the weekend.

On the same day Wixx took home more than \$2 million for winning the Queen Elizabeth Stakes at Royal Randwick, the Yalgoo Cup winner pocketed \$5,600.

People in thongs and flannelette shirts were just as much at home as those dressed up for fashions on the field, for the highlight of the local event calendar.

It is the first time the races have been run in three years, after health and safety issues and bad weather forced the past couple of events to be

cancelled.

Like all smaller race clubs, the Yalgoo Jockey Club battles with funding issues for the upkeep of the course, as well as being able to offer stakes to make the travel to compete worthwhile.

WA's oldest working jockey Danny Miller, who turns 69 this year, raced at Yalgoo for the first time.

The jockey, known as Dashing Dan or the Country Cup King, said race days like this were important for country communities.

"I think you need them for the town's sake, and for people to get another interest," he said.

"For country people it's something for them to look forward to. It involves the whole community."

Miller said he would like to see more stake money flowing through to the smaller race events.

"Stakes should be lowered a bit and spread out a bit. I think that would help the industry a bit more."

Yalgoo deputy shire president Raul Valenzuela said funding was a big issue and it was about more than horse racing.

"When you live in the middle of nowhere, activities like this pull the families together. Every family around comes together to enjoy the day," he said.

"This is most important for our community."

North West Central MP calls comments by new Minister short-sighted

Nationals WA Member for North West Central, Vince Catania MLA has rejected the comments recently made by the new Minister for Regional Development as short-sighted and lacking the understanding of the true value of the Royalties for Regions program (RfR) for regional communities.

Minister for Regional Development, Alannah MacTieman said that she will implement a review of the \$30million Ningaloo Centre, which was part funded by RfR, to ascertain how much money has been wasted and whether development of the Centre was poorly planned and managed by the Exmouth Shire.

Mr Catania said "This project has been driven by the community and local government to ensure greater investment into the area and is very important to the many local businesses that supply goods and services that make Exmouth a growing tourism destination"

"In fact, I question the motives of the Minister when making the comments she has. I believe that she is just softening up communities in my electorate for a full shift away from delivering any further benefits through the RfR program", Mr Catania said.

At the recent State Election, the new Labor Government released election funding costings that showed a reduction of \$2.3billion from the RfR program over 3 years.

Mr Catania said "After touring this fantastic new facility last week, I can see the potential that will be realised when it is fully completed, attracting fee paying businesses as tenants and bustling with tourists attracted to Exmouth as a Centre of Excellence at the gateway to the Ningaloo Reef."

"Local projects like the Ningaloo Centre are important to diversify our local economies away from the traditional boom and bust cycle of digging up rocks or drilling for oil and gas, helping to develop Exmouth into a global tourism destination that will attract a new wave of interest and investment", Mr Catania said.

Community alert: Tomato potato psyllid

Home gardeners urged to check for and report tomato potato psyllid

The Department of Agriculture and Food, Western Australia (DAFWA) is working with the WA horticulture industry to respond to the detection of tomato potato psyllid, an exotic plant pest.

This is the first time the psyllid has been detected in Australia.

Tomato potato psyllid attacks a range of plants including potato, tomato, eggplant, capsicum, chilli, tamarillo, cape gooseberry, goji berry, and sweet potato. The weeds nightshade, groundcherry, African boxthorn, kangaroo apple and field bindweed are also hosts of the pest.

You can help to determine the spread of the pest by checking your plants and immediately reporting any suspect detections.

You can do this via the free [MyPestGuide Reporter app](#), which is available from the [Google Play](#) or the [App Store](#). Alternatively, you can email photos with your name, address and mobile number to info@agric.wa.gov.au, or call the Pest and Disease Information Service on 1800 084 881.

About the tomato potato psyllid and what to look for

The tomato potato psyllid is a tiny sap-sucking insect with three stages of development – egg, nymph and adult. Adults and nymphs of tomato potato psyllid cause injury to plants by feeding with sucking mouth parts.

Look for the insect in all its life stages on the underside of leaves.

Signs of tomato potato psyllid include:

- Insects jumping from the foliage when disturbed.
- White sugar-like granules which coat the plant leaves and stems, and can lead to the development of sooty mould.
- Yellowing of leaf margins and upward curling of the leaves.
- Severe wilting of plants caused by high numbers of psyllids feeding.
- Shortening of stem internodes.
- Stem death similar to other potato and tomato disorders.

Quarantine Area Notice

A Quarantine Area Notice (QAN) is in place to direct the movement and treatment of specified fruit, vegetables and seedlings to contain and control the pest.

The QAN divides Western Australia into three quarantine zones — a Control (red) Zone, Suppression (orange) Zone and Watch (blue) Zone. To find out how you might be affected, and for additional general information, visit www.agric.wa.gov.au/top

Ten people attended with two apologies, Kerry Seivwright handed the reins over to Jenni Dennis.


