

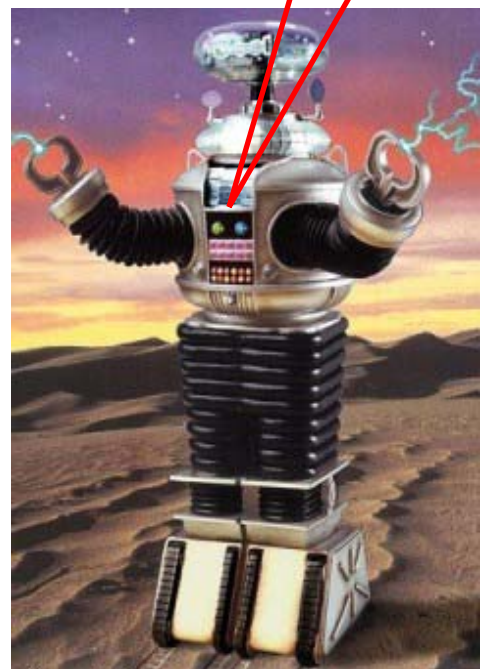

Welcome to STORMCO who are once again visiting Cue to present their school holiday programs. While in town, the STORMCO crew are volunteering their time to tidy up the breakaways at the rifle range and beyond. The effort put in by the group over the many years of their visits has been a marvellous contribution to our community.

Volunteer health promotion organisation, Fair Game, will run sports and exercise sessions for kids from 9am to 12pm in the grassed area next to the water park on Wednesday 12 July.

Congratulations to the organisers of the Purple Bra trivia night and especially to Ian and Jenni Dennis for running a successful event. Funds raised support West Australians facing breast cancer. 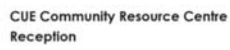
The Annual General Meeting of the WA Local Government Association will be held at the Perth Convention and Exhibition Centre during the WA Local Convention week in August. Representatives from councils across the state will discuss issues of statewide significance for the local government industry. Councillors Ross Pigdon, Les Price, Pixie Pigdon, Ron Hogben and Ian Dennis will attend.

Cr Ian Dennis and I attended a meeting in Mount Magnet with representatives from Shires in the Murchison Region and Professor Ross Dowling to discuss the potential for geo-tourism in this area. Councils within the region were successful in obtaining funding assistance through the Midwest Development Commission to develop a proposal to assist in proving up the concept. Professor Dowling considers that the Murchison is ideally suited for geo-tourism and could potentially be Australia's first geo-park.

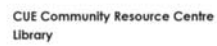

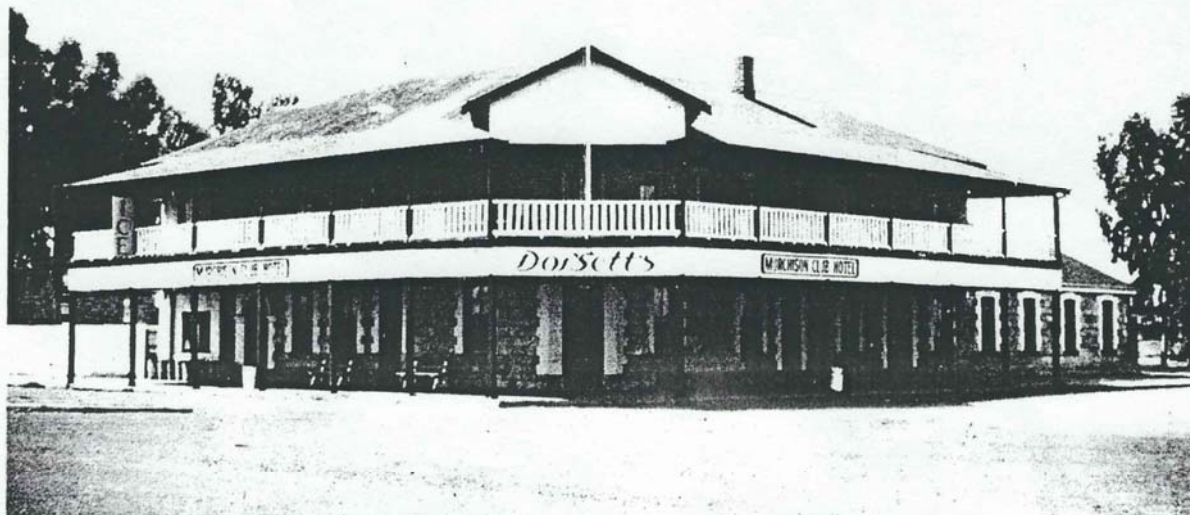

Railways of The "Murchinson" Area — by Malcom Searle PART TWO



The Mullewa to Murchison Railway

An advertisement which appeared in the "Victoria Express" at Geraldton on August 27th 1894 read "Gascard and Co Goldfields coaches. Passenger coaches and parcel vans will commence running to and from the head of the Mullewa line and Cue. Biweekly leaving Mullewa on Tuesday and Saturday after arrival of the contractors train via the following important mining centres, Gabyon, Yalgoo, Mt Magnet, The Island and Four Mile to Cue returning via the same route.

In February 1894 the Commissioner of Railways the Honourable H.W. Venn had received a letter from Mr Chas G. Lush representing a group of Sydney capitalists interested in constructing a steam tramway from Mullewa to Cue. Mr Lush pointed out the success of the privately owned Silverton Tramway which was running between Broken Hill and the South Australian border, a scheme bought about mainly due to his exertions. It was proposed to form a Company to be known as the "Murchison Goldfields Railway and Tramway Co Ltd." The Government would be invited to purchase the line at any stage.

No doubt due to the unsatisfactory and controversial dealings with the Midland Railway Co the Government had no wish to repeat the lesson and advised the Sydney Syndicate that it was proposed the Government would construct the line itself.

The Mines Department Annual Report of 1895 states "Business on the Murchison Goldfield was so active at so many different centres that early in the year the southern portion was separated and formed into the Yalgoo Goldfields.

The number of mines around Cue, the Wardens Headquarters, and at Day Dawn a few miles to the south west is considerable, there being no less than 17 batteries erected in the vicinity of Cue. Around Nannure, which is the northern most district of the field, there are five batteries and in the Mt Magnet district there are two."

"Murchison Club" Hotel Cue 1979

Surveys for a railway between Mullewa and Cue commenced on September 1st 1894 and were completed in a record time by January 20th 1895. At one stage there were ten survey parties engaged on the project.

Assent to the "Mullewa to Cue Railway Act" was given on November 23rd 1894 and the contract for £84,535-2-3 let to Baxter and Prince on the last day of 1895.

Route of the proposed railway was from a point within the Mullewa station yard thence proceeding in a generally north easterly by easterly direction for about 142 miles, thence in a north easterly direction for about 31 miles, thence in a northerly direction for about 37 miles, terminating at a point in or near Cue townsite.

Total length of the railway was to be about 210 miles and would be constructed through lightly timbered country for the most part with some rocky ridges and granite being passed near Wurarga, after which light surface formation commenced again. Steepest grade was to be 1-60, sharpest curve of 15 chains radius and the summit being reached at the 224¼ mile (Lennonville). Wayside stations were to be built at Pindar, Wurarga and Wolla-Wolla. At Yalgoo a station of special design was to be constructed from stone, with the usual offices and a Refreshment Room. Yalgoo was also to be provided with Goods Shed, Engine Shed, Coal Store, Turntable, Engine Tank, Cranes, weighbridge a livestock yards. Wayside stations were to be constructed at Nanawtharra, Murrum and Yoweragabbie. At Mt Magnet a stone station would be provided together with Goods Shed, turntable and ancillary facilities. Austin and Day Dawn would have stations similar to Mt Magnet and at Cue there would be a special station with stationmaster's house, engine shed, carriage shed, turntables and sundry other facilities.

Now here is a story I think you will find intriguing. I heard it from a friend of a friend of mine.

THE KORBLIMEYWOTZAT!

Patients not using free Angel Service

The head of a national charity that flies rural patients into town has visited Geraldton to find out why the free service is not being used in W.A.

Angel flight carries non - emergency patients to medical professionals in the city, picking them up from rural airfields and fixing them up with on-the-ground transport in Perth, or whichever city their specialist is in, to get them directly to the medical facility.

Angel Flight chief executive Marjorie Pagani made her appeal to local pilots after the Valley View Air Display, and found plenty of willing and able volunteers, but said there main concern was raising awareness among patients and health professionals in W.A.

"We've got an increasing number of pilots....but I don't like to actively drum up numbers without patients there for them to fly," she said.

"My main message is two-fold: to tell the people that if they know someone who has trouble driving to Perth for their medical needs all the time they need to know about this....and we're also trying to get the health professionals on board".

"It's funny, I shouldn't have to be selling a free service, but we do so much work in the southern and eastern States — I'm sure this service must be needed here because it's the same distance as Queensland, so what we really need to do is focus on Getting the medical profession sending us flight requests."

Ms Pagani said the organisation had about 3500 pilots and 4200 drivers registered to help out around the country, with a fleet of planes that include a range of different aircraft, ensuring there was enough space for carers if needed, and faster planes could be used for more remote locations.

The only requirement for being allowed to use Angel Flight's service is the doctor must register themselves as a referrer with the organisation, and then assess the patient as having a need.

This need is usually financial, but can also extend to cover a lack of available public transport, situations where a patient might be weak after treatment, and other various family or personal circumstances. Pilots are paid for their fuel, but give there time and aircraft for free, which Ms Pagani said "played to their love of flying".

One such pilot, Mid West Aero Club president Peter Teakle, has registered to be a volunteer, and is eagerly awaiting his chance to help someone.

While some pilots were able to fly up from Perth to bring people back down from the mid-west and Gascoyne, Mr Teakle said having pilots flying from Geraldton would cut an hour or more off the total flight time. "There's a pool of pilots here in the Aero Club in Geraldton that would be able to handle considerable demand for these services," Mr Teakle said.

HOW TLG IS HELPING OUR KIDS' FUTURE

Education is the most important thing that we can give our kids to ensure that they are on the right track to a brighter future. However, on average, remote students are 2 years behind metropolitan schools, and students in remote locations are 12 times more likely to be below the national minimum standard in Mathematics. Furthermore, 3 in 5 Indigenous kids living in remote areas will never finish school. This educational gap between urban and rural students mean that remote and rural students are often severely disadvantaged when it comes to educational opportunities.

However, over 230 volunteers from Teach Learn Grow (TLG) are volunteering their time to offer one-to-one tutoring for a week to help make a change for our kids. TLG is a not-for-profit organization and their mission is to help bridge the gap of educational disadvantage in WA. Every child deserves to have equal opportunities in education, which is why TLG aims to improve the educational outcomes and aspirations of rural and Indigenous students in socio-disadvantaged areas so that they can reach their full potential.

On the 25th of June, a group of volunteers came to Cue to volunteer their time to tutor students at Cue Primary School. They interacted with the wider school cohort each day and immersed themselves in the local community. By sending these well-educated volunteers to tutor and act as positive role models to the students, TLG aimed to improve the students' educational achievements and their value towards their education. Above all, they were striving to empower our students to reach their educational goals and potentials.

"With the help of sponsors such as Horizon, TLG has been able to thrive and thus effectively help our students at Cue Primary School reach their full educational potential."

Catania says WA Labor won't cut its election promises to repair budget

Nationals WA Member for North West Central Vince Catania MLA, has said that while the WA Labor Government continue to burden the people of WA with massive increase to household fees and charges, they aren't considering cutting any of their election commitments.

Last week Treasurer Ben Wyatt announced that he would impose double-digit increases to household services such as electricity, water and vehicle registration fees in order to fix the state budget.

"The Treasurer says that in order to help fix the state budget he is content to slug mums, dads and pensioners across WA with this massive increase to their basic household fees and charges, but we haven't heard one word about which of their election commitments they are cutting," Mr Catania said.

"I believe that if they were serious about fixing the State's budget then they should be first looking at which of their big spending election promises they are going to cut to share the burden with the people of WA."

During the 2017 WA election campaign WA Labor made more than \$5 billion worth of election commitments.

"The \$238 million he is ripping out of the hip pockets of mums, dads and pensioners, and the \$100 million that is being gouged from port users will hardly even pay the interest bill to pay of the \$42billion state debt that the Treasurer is responsible for," Mr Catania said.

"I think we can clearly see that Mark McGowan and Ben Wyatt aren't interested in fixing the state budget before they have used these increases to household charges and WA businesses to help pay for their election promises."

"The question that they both have to answer is when will they stop cutting services to the people of WA while hitting them with these massive increases and fees just to be able to fund their \$5 billion in election promises that they haven't even produced a business case for," Mr Catania said

CRCs the latest victims of Labor's RfR cuts

Community Resource Centres are in a state of confusion after being informed last week of drastic changes to their proposed contracts by the Labor government.

A number of CRCs, which deliver important services in towns throughout Western Australia, learnt last week that their new contracts will be shorter than expected. The new Government will also investigate changing the services CRCs deliver and closing some centres. This comes as part of Labor's internal review of all Royalties for Regions projects, creating doubt about the future of some Community Resource Centres.

Member for Moore Shane Love MLA said the changes meant more uncertainty for regional CRCs.

"The Labor Government is simply using the tender process as an opportunity to make cuts from services in regional WA," he said. "The last thing regional towns with poor internet service or limited access to government departments need is CRCs to close their doors.

Mr Love said the news of a review into the functions and locations of the CRCs was also causing alarm.

"This just generates further anxiety as communities wait to see the fate of their services," he said. "We now have CRCs uncertain if they will even exist in 18 months' time."

Mr Love said the decision was typical of the first few months of the Labor Government, which had fallen well short of community expectation on consultation.

"It seems the Minister for Regional Development sits in her West Perth office issuing last-minute directives, while ignoring the work done by regional communities to secure funding and the significant impact of taking it away," he said. "I am calling on the Minister to provide clarity and certainty around all Royalties for Regions projects immediately."

Mr Love said The Nationals would continue to hold the government to account on all Royalties for Regions projects, both inside and outside of Parliament, as they look to cut the program to fund Metronet and other Labor commitments in Perth.
