FROM THE DESK OF THE CEO

WA Heritage Awards

The Cue Community & Visitor Centre was a double winner at the WA Heritage Awards held in Perth on Friday, 23 March. I was excited to be present, along with architects Suzie Hunt and Stephen Carrick, as the Centre was announced the winner in the category of Adaptive Reuse of a State Registered Place. To make it a truly memorable night, the Centre was then chosen as the winner of the Gerry Gauntlett Award for Excellence in Conservation or Adaptive Reuse.



Marshall Street Intersection

The Marshall Street black spot project is progressing, with construction of a permanent garden bed providing protection for motorists using this intersection with Austin Street (Great Northern Highway). Formal entries to the roadhouse from Austin Street have been redefined. These will be sealed in the near future and the area re-kerbed. The owner of the roadhouse is installing new high flow diesel bowsters South of the current canopy to cater for large road trains and heavy transport vehicles. The combination of these changes is expected to improve safety for all users of the roadhouse.

Footpath Program

Tenders have been called for the next stage of the Shire's footpath program, with new footpaths to be constructed on Dowley, McCarthy and Allen Streets.

Roadworks

WANDRRA (WA Natural Disaster Relief & Recovery) funded works on Beebyn-Karbar Road are continuing and will be ongoing for several months. While these works are underway the road will be closed to all but local traffic. Preparations for additional sealing work on Beringarra-Cue Road are continuing. Maintenance grading has been undertaken on Kalli Road, Big Bell-Coodardy Road, Coodardy-Noondie Road and Afghan Rock-Coodardy Road.

Community Paramedic

St John Ambulance have advised the appointment of a new Community Paramedic for the region for the next 12 months. Shane Toovey replaces Andy Wright in the role. Welcome to the Murchison, Shane.

Bowling Green

The retaining wall and sub base for the bowling green at the Shire Hall have been completed in preparation for the installation of its artificial surface. Synthetic Bowling Solutions are currently preparing the green for a Greenguage carpet with underlay in a format which will accommodate up to three rinks to world bowls standards. It is anticipated that the bowling green will be ready for use by the end of April.



Cue Parliament

The next meeting of Cue Parliament will be held on Tuesday 24 April. Representatives from Shires in the Murchison Zone of the WA Local Government Association will gather to discuss topics of importance to the region.

Parking in Post Office Street

Since the Cue Community and Visitor Centre has opened in the old Post Office building, I have observed people pulling into Post Office Street and parking next to the building. Please note that this is a public thoroughfare and people parking in this area are effectively parked in the middle of the street. Ample parking is available on Austin Street at the front of the building.

Thinking of installing a swimming pool or spa?

or

Do you have a swimming pool or spa already installed?

In Western Australia, private swimming pools and spas that are capable of holding more than 300mm deep of water must have a compliant barrier installed. This is intended to help prevent the drowning deaths and injury of young children under the age of five years.

This requirement applies to:

- in-ground pools and spas;
- above-ground pools and spas (including inflatable and portable pools and spas);
- indoor pools and spas (but not spa baths that are normally emptied after each use); and
- wading pools (containing water that is more than 300mm deep).

Generally, a building permit is required under the [Building Act 2011](#) to construct or install a swimming or spa pool and its associated safety barrier.

Prior to a building permit being granted by a permit authority (usually the relevant local government), a registered building surveyor is required to confirm that the proposed pool and its safety barrier comply with the applicable building standards by signing a '[Certificate of Design Compliance](#)' (CDC).

The applicable building standards include the:

- structural adequacy of the pool or spa;
- water recirculation system;
- energy efficiency for heating and pumping;
- water efficiency (that is, a pool blanket or cover that is designed to reduce water evaporation and is accredited under the Smart Approved Watermark Scheme www.smartwatermark.org); and
- safety barrier.

Anyone can apply for a building permit, the owner, pool builder or barrier installer. Applicants can choose to submit either a certified or uncertified application for a pool and its safety barrier.

Already Installed?

Please contact the Shire office on 9963 8600 and ensure that your pool and/or spa are registered with Council so that the mandatory inspections required by legislation are carried out as required. Following this, the Environmental Health Officer will conduct an inspection, identify areas of concern and issue a report to the owner seeking co-operation to address them without the need for litigation.

Traffic management company forges a new road for Aboriginal careers in regional WA

A new Aboriginal-owned traffic management company wants to provide career opportunities for potentially hundreds of Aboriginal people in regional Western Australia.

IQ Traffic launches this week to provide innovative, safe and tailored traffic management services to clients in the Mid West, the South West and the Goldfields.

The new traffic start-up will provide an important vehicle for Aboriginal employment in the regions. IQ Traffic will offer Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people unprecedented training and career opportunities in the traffic management industry. The company is the result of a partnership between WA Aboriginal consultancy company IPS and traffic management company Quality Traffic Management.

"There is a real need for more Aboriginal businesses in WA, and for those businesses to provide greater career and training opportunities," IQ Traffic Managing Director Katina Law said.

"Particularly in the regions, we want to see opportunities in a culturally safe work environment."

IQ Traffic has adopted a four pillar approach to providing opportunities, according to Ms Law, through Aboriginal ownership, employment, supplier engagement and career pathways.

The company is actively engaging with State and Local Government agencies and corporate clients to unearth and drive opportunities.

"There is a social return on investment – for every dollar paid to an Aboriginal business, more than \$4 of economic and social value is created," Ms Law said.

"If you speak to any successful person or business, you are likely to find that somewhere along the way, someone took a chance on them, removed a barrier, took a leap of faith. IQ Traffic will be taking conscious steps to provide opportunities, which will then have a flow on effect in families, businesses and communities.

"Our aim is to be the biggest regionally-based traffic business in WA."

IQ Traffic will provide clients with the opportunity to meet their supplier diversity requirements, a key plank of the WA Government's new Aboriginal Procurement Policy.

IQ Traffic will officially launch at the Aboriginal Business Expo at the Optus Stadium in Perth on Thursday March 29. The Expo is a tradeshow hosted by the Department of Finance, aiming to build relationships between the Aboriginal Business Sector and government buyers, ahead of the launch of WA's APP on July 1.

Midwest cancer patients will be at home with new hostel

The Midwest Cancer Hostel will provide rural communities with access to the health services they need, as close to home as possible, when it opens its doors later this year.

WA Country Health Service's Acting Regional Director Midwest, Karen Street, said the hostel was an important development for the region, which will enable people to live as part of their community while also receiving the support and treatment they require.

"A cancer journey can be long and arduous; more an uphill trek than an actual journey.

"Providing health services as close to home as possible is an important step in the health and wellbeing of our rural communities and the hostel is closely located behind the recently completed Midwest Cancer Centre to ensure patients are near to their treatment facilities.

"With seven double rooms, the accommodation is great news for not only the people receiving treatment, but their carers too," said Karen.

Careful consideration has gone into the design of the new hostel which will provide a welcoming, non-clinical, safe, secure and culturally appropriate facility for patients traveling to the Midwest for their cancer treatment.

"The brief was simple – to create a home away from home and I think we have achieved that."

Senior architect Nick Silich, SPH Architecture and Interiors, is pleased with the progress of the hostel, which will allow patients to be treated and cared for in modern, state-of-the-art facilities close to their families and loved ones.

"At the heart of the design is the focus on patient recovery and wellbeing," said Nick.

"Meandering paths, thoughtful landscaping and entry from the rear of the units through the outdoor areas all help to provide a layered transition between the public and private spaces."

Raked ceilings in all the rooms will also provide patients with a sense of openness and light.

The \$1.38 million Midwest Cancer Hostel is being constructed by the WA Country Health Service on behalf of the Australian Government's Health and Hospitals Fund (HHF).

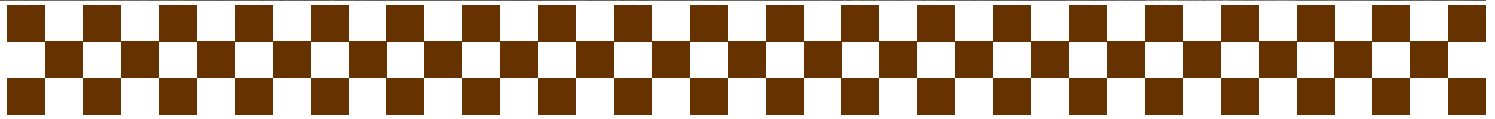
It is expected to be completed mid-year and will be a welcome addition to those who need a 'home away from home.'

- Ensure that client goals are constantly updated so that assistance can be customized;
- Monitor participant attendance at WfD activities;
- Liaising with CDP Manager about any case management-related issues;
- Encourage and support participants to participate in CDP in accordance with their Job Plan;
- Create weekly attendance lists and timesheets for Activity Supervisors and other relevant stakeholders;
- Ensure accurate, appropriate and timely recording of attendance at activities in the relevant IT system;
- Liaise with internal and external stakeholders to maximise job seeker outcomes;
- Support participants with obtaining paid employment and conduct appropriate post placement support to enhance sustainability of employment;

- Maintain files, file notes, timesheets, activity lists and relevant forms for participants on your case load to ensure contractual compliance;
- Maintain a sound level of understanding of CDP, and compliance with CDP contractual requirements, policies and program guidelines;
- Provide relief supervision, mentoring and support to CDP participants attending Work for the Dole activities;

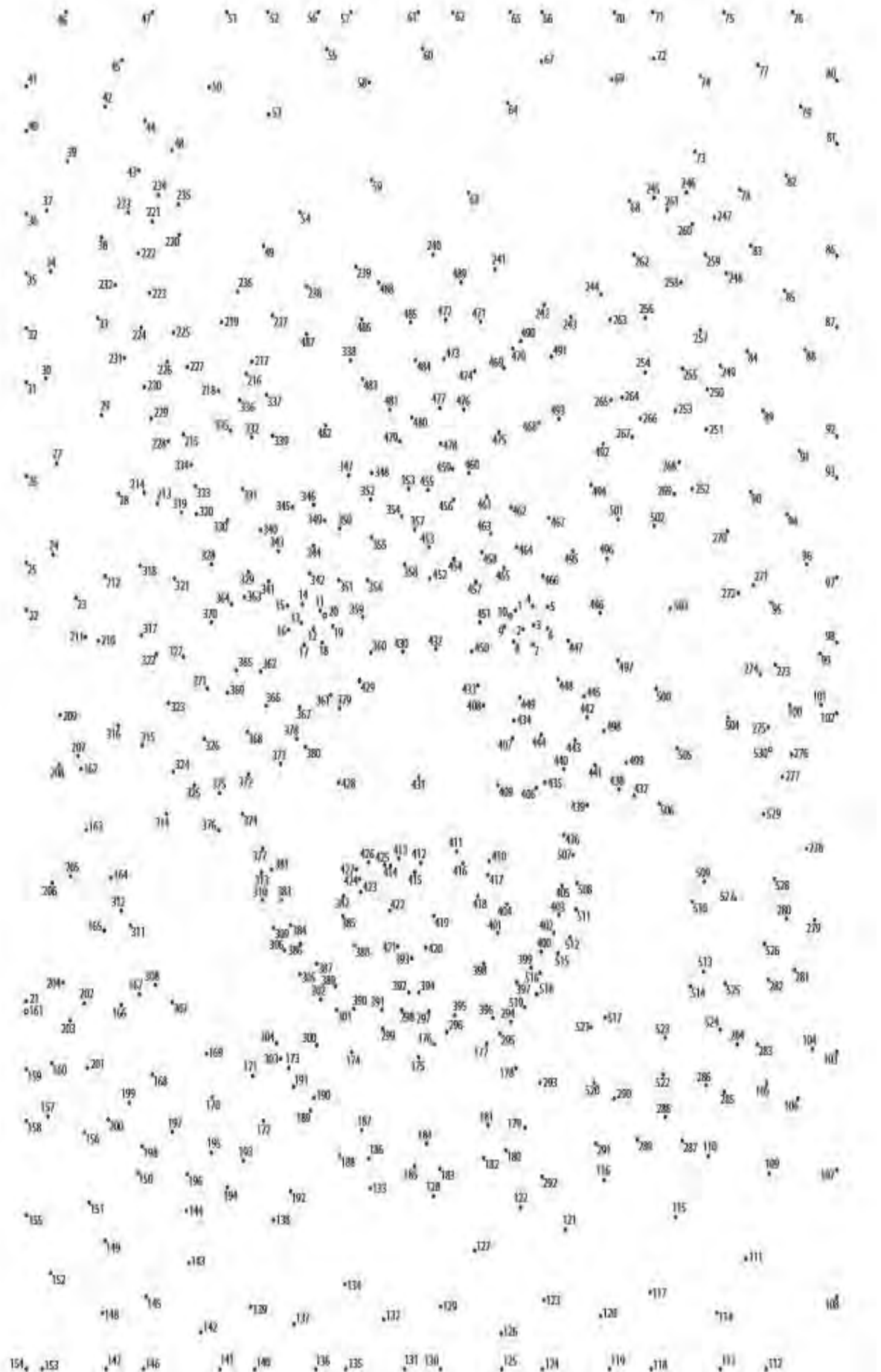

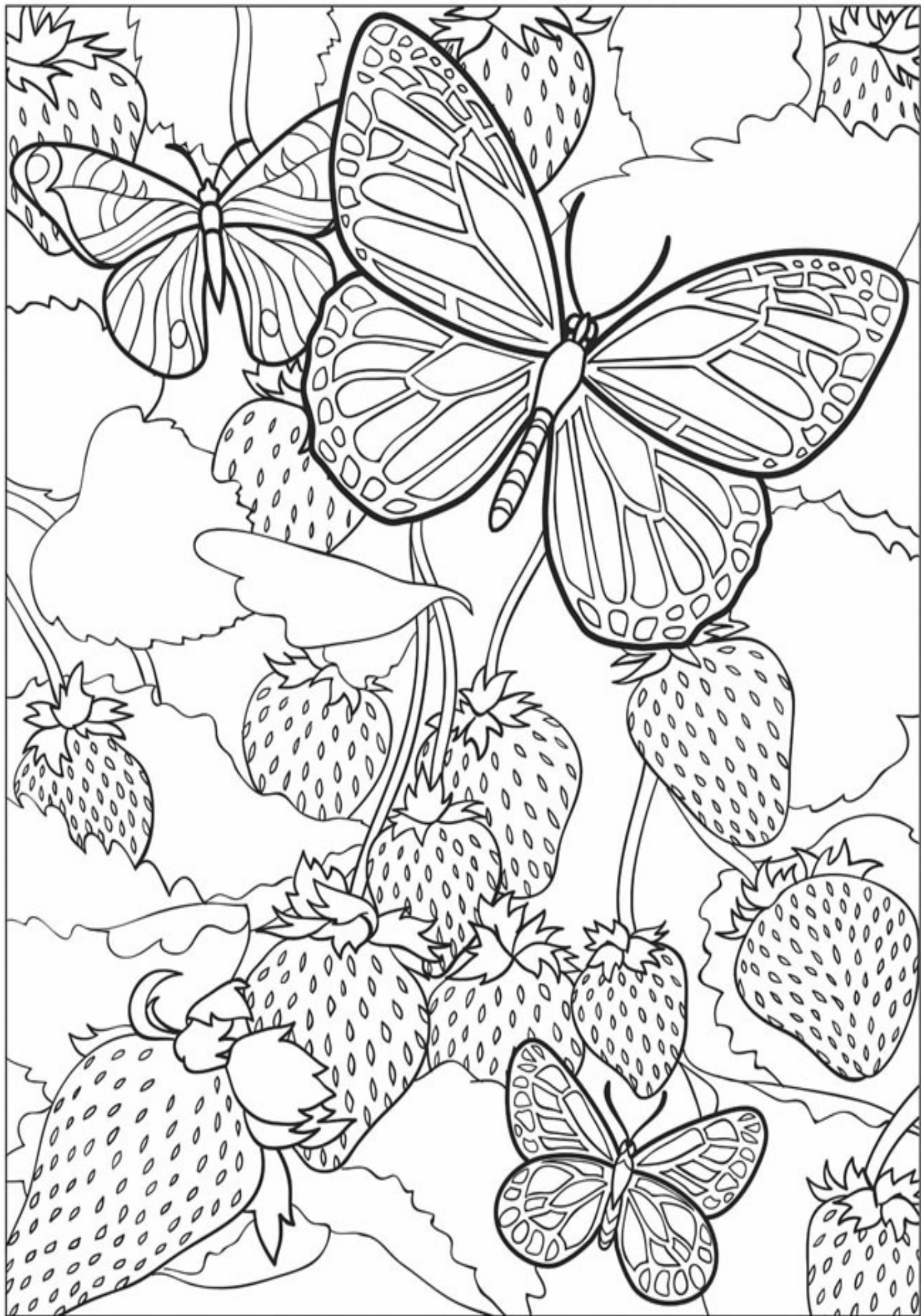

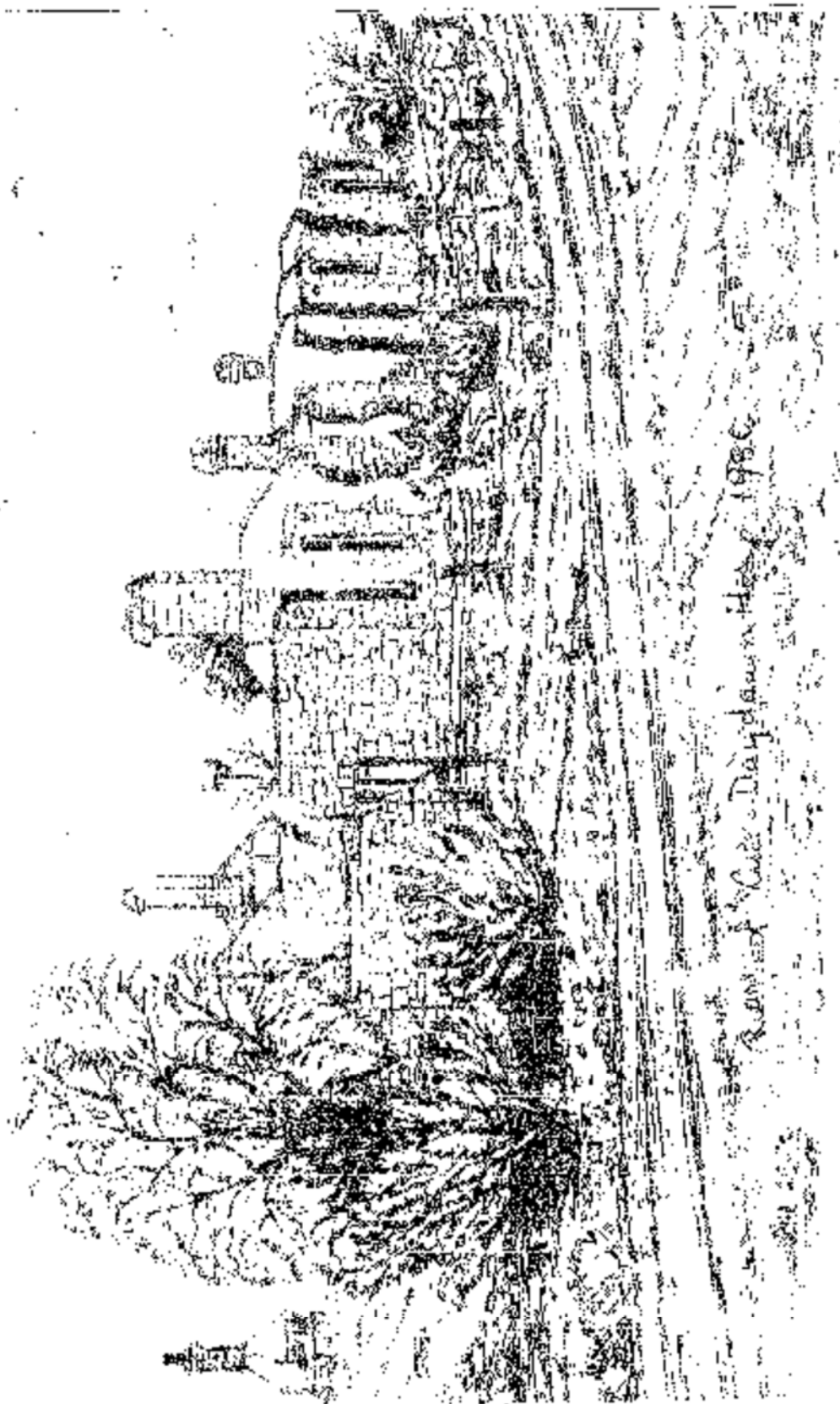
